## List (but not exhaustive!) of possible glass objects to bring – consider bubbling/texture/opacity/temperature/weight

Paper weight, a glass, egg timer, frosted beach glass, empty picture frame, glass trinket box, plate, carafe, fibre-optic strands, fibreglass, terrarium, goldfish bowl, lightbulb, Marmite jar, lamp, necklace, sunglasses, rolling pin, Christmas tree bauble, bottle, glass microscope slide, coaster, decanter, Pyrex, bugle beads, telescope/binoculars/monocle, Art Deco Uranium glass, statue, blue salt cellar lining, Thermos, stained glass, mirror, "drink me" bottle, jam jar, iPhone screen (smashed?), pigment grinder, bell jar, spun glass, old projector slide, fire-retardant fabric, magnifying glass, door plate, light switch, float glass, display case, computer screen, door handle, swizzle stick, window, fire + sand, glass headed pin, cake stand, vase, marble, slipper...or anything else.
